DID YOU KNOW:

You may live in a Historic District

The National Register of Historic Places is the official list of the Nation's historic places worthy of preservation. Much of the Fairpark Community area was added to the National Register in 2001 with the creation of the Salt Lake City Northwest Historic District that stretches from North

Temple to 600 North and from the railroad tracks, on the East, to 1100 West.

The 2001 application for the listing on the national register was prepared by Korral Broschinsky for the Utah Division of State History, Office of Historic Preservation. You can find the application, accompanied by a separate document with 64 photographs, on the National Register of Historic Places

website. The application offers a history, beginning in the 1850s, of the development of our community as the decades have passed. Its descriptions, and brief histories, of the different types of houses that we can still see as we walk the streets of our neighborhoods, along with an overview of churches and other public buildings, and the commercial growth along North Temple are fascinating.

Meeting Minutes for August 25th

Executive committee in attendance: Gordon Storrs, Marialice Jones, Steve Johnson, Brad Hart and Michael Barnes.


Note: August's meeting was preceded by a wonderful potluck dinner.

- 1. Gordon welcomed everyone.
- 2. Steve Johnson talked about the bylaws of the Fairpark Community Council. The current bylaws were amended in 2006 from the original Northwest Community Council bylaws from 1976. A committee has been reviewing them for changes and has a draft that will presented for review and approval by the at-large board at their meeting on September 6. If approved, they will be presented to the council at the next meeting.
- 3. Gordon updated the council on work that has been done to get the community council officially registered as a 501(c)3 nonprofit and to expand the at-large board. He introduced Maria Barajas, as a prospective new member to the board. She took a few minutes to introduce herself to the council. Gordon made a motion to nominate Maria to the board; the motion was seconded by Steve Johnson, and was approved by unanimous vote. Maria will focus on increasing community

- involvement and participation with the council.
- 4. Jordan Jones shared a presentation that he and Gina Zivkovic had given at Breakfast with the Mayor, which is a bi-monthly meeting with the Mayor and chairpersons from all community councils in the city. The mayor has asked each council to give a presentation detailing their area of the city. The presentation included a slideshow featuring photos of the neighborhoods in the Fairpark area and highlighted the history, culture, diversity, recreation, community festivals, churches, urban gardens and general awesomeness of the area. It was reported that the presentation was well received at the mayor's breakfast.
- 5. City council district two candidates were each given five minutes to introduce themselves and talk about why we should vote for them. Kyle LaMalfa and Van Turner each spoke. Michael Clara was invited but was excused due to family business. An opportunity to ask the candidates questions followed.
- **6.** Tham Soekotjo announced that \$5

- coupons for North Temple businesses are available at Neighborworks Salt Lake office. He reported that 13 houses were painted by volunteers at the annual Paint Your Heart Out event earlier this August.
- 7. Jen Seelig, Utah House of Representatives, gave an update. The redistricting debate continues, hopefully to be done by October. She thinks this area will not be split up in the process. She has also been working on solutions for human trafficking problems that are going on statewide.
- 8. Carlton Christensen, City Council district one, said that the city is beginning its redistricting as well. Public input will be gathered, and a working group has been formed to give recommendations.
- 9. Input from community members: Gordon read a list of goals that have been identified by the board, and who is assigned to each. Also discussed were how to start a neighborhood watch, and an idea to beautify 1000 West Street.
- 10. Michael Stott, Mayor's Office, spoke about the proposed Broadway-style theater for Main Street. He reported on the Regional Athletic Complex, saying that groundwork has begun for construction but litigation from environmental groups is stalling the release of the bond that will fund the project. He also spoke about the new Good Landlord program that will go into effect September 1st.
- **11.**Michael B. motioned to adjourn, Gina Z. seconded, and the meeting was adjourned.
