Council member Dennis Faris (District 2) announced CIP (capital improvement project) program approved, includes the following: Three Creeks Confluence park trail way, Glendale waterpark masterplan (old Raging Waters turned into Regional park), Emerald river (pond?) master plan, Poplar Grove tennis courts, 700 S road configuration, 900 S Railroad crossing, 600 N corridor transformation, etc.

Redistricting is coming, city council boundaries will likely change, must have federal, state, etc. boundaries first.

Street racers update, with steel plates and jersey barriers.

Public safety employee's salaries increased (20 new police officers)

7:05pm Legislative

No legislators in attendance

7:15pm Villa Nueva Apartments on 915 West 200 North, Katherine Kittrell gave contact information for feedback, 12 units to 35 units with not parking, projected rent is over \$1,000, construction is in a TSA zone. A lot has gone into the design. Construction is planned to be complete in around a year. No ground floor parking. Status is waiting for permits.

Fair starts Sept. 8th, temporary 4-way stop will start Sept. 2

Andrew Johnston, former city council, became city's director of homelessness policy and outreach (new position April 2021) explained how state/federal governments have typically funded most services for homeless. Mentioned Wayne Niederhauser (State homeless coordinator) had been in the process of gathering information, local homeless councils have been established to make recommendations, etc. Non-profits tend to offer the actual services. Johnston explained that city's roll in homeless needs to align to county and state.

In SLC there are around 1,500 people each night that do not have a place to go, ~ 300-500 each night even if all resource beds are filled. No camping ordinance, SLC one of only a few cities that does not enforce everywhere all of the time. Goal of coalition we need about 450 units of housing (perspective Seattle would need ~ 4,500), SLC is looking to acquire additional hotel, Airport Inn will house on 30-day leases, Other Side Village, plans for a place with folks with medical issues.

7:30pm The Other Side Village (connected to Other Side Academy) tiny home concept. 1850 W. Indiana Avenue. Joseph Grenny

Presentation. Delancey Street (see link below) is model for the Other Side Village (see link below). Discussion about what it will do to the neighborhood ensued. Timeline discussed (4 to 5 years until it reaches any capacity) Timeline for city to have 300 more beds available around a year. Concern about putting it in a neighborhood that already has a lot of challenges. Suggestion that they form a board with neighborhood and Other Side so that concerns will be addressed. 45-day open public comment period opened last week, Nigel encourages people to do it.
